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'Gulf Golf!'-The Perfect Golf Getaway

hen you live in a fabulous golf state like Michigan, it's not always clear why anyone would golf elsewhere, except for one compelling reason - WINTER.

Once little white snowflakes begin to replace little white golf balls flying through the air, it's time for Michigan golfers to head south. And what better place than the Gulf Coast of Florida?

Wishing to explore 'Gulf golf' before the onslaught of northern snowbirds, my husband, Paul, and I participated in an October media 'Writer's Cup' tour of Florida's Gulf Coast. Guided by Heather $\stackrel{\square}{\geq}$ Cooke, of Golf Placement Services Inc. www.golfplacementservices.com, we and 13 other golf writers from the United States, Canada and Europe enjoyed a weeklong team competition as we toured and golfed nine different courses from Tampa, in northern central Florida, to Florida's southernmost Gulf resort destination, Marco Island.

Copperhead Hole No. 15, Innisbrook Resort and Golf Club

From start to finish, our journey was a toasty continuation of the Michigan summer we had just kissed good-bye. And the golf was diverse and challenging as our descent in latitude was distinctively marked by changes in the vegetation, topography and style of the courses.

Our first stop was Innisbrook Resort and Golf Club www.innisbrookgolfresort.com in Palm Harbor, near Tampa. Situated in a

Recently purchased by Sheila Johnson and her firm, Salamander Hospitality, Innisbrook is enjoying a massive infusion of investment capital and energy, which translates to multimillion dollar course and resort improvements.

Home to the Pods Championship and Fed/Ex Cup on the PGA Tour, Innisbrook has more than 600 renovated suites, 65,000 square feet of meeting space, six swimming pools - including its sizable 'Loch Ness Monster Pool.'

tennis and fitness centers, four restaurants and four 18-hole golf courses, including the tournament Island Course and top-ranked Copperhead, as well as Highlands North and South courses.

Playing Copperhead, we found the golf challenging, yet fair, and enjoyed the way the course showcased "Old Florida" with its traditional layout and native vegetation, including oaks, pines and Spanish mosses. At the edge of the Ocala Sand Ridge, the Innisbrook golf courses feature rolling hills and undulating greens, plus something

that's getting harder and harder to find at resorts - great walking courses for professional tournament play.

Stop Two on our tour was the 'most popular public golf course' in Tampa Bay's Pinellas Country -Bardmoor Golf and Tennis Club www.bardmoorgolf.com Host to the PGA/LPGA JC Penney Classic for 13 years, and longtime home to numerous professional tennis tournaments, Bardmoor has local and international notoriety. The par 72 course was redesigned by Gary Koch in 2001 and measures 7,015

from the tips and 5,045 from the forward tees.

What makes Bardmoor so popular? General Manager and Director of Golf Jerry Moore says it's its location, "close to all of the beaches and Tampa," and its playability. "All ages and abilities...can come out and have a really good time," he said. "It's a classic layout - very eye-appealing, and it has good shot capability."

From there, we landed at

Emerald Greens Private Resort www.stayandplaytampa.com Located on the site of the old Carrollwood Village Golf and Tennis Club, Emerald Greens is a luxury resort that has risen from the demolition dust of the old facilities. Our media group was literally the first guests to enjoy Emerald Greens luxury accommodations and facilities.

Designed by Dan Maples, Emerald Greens Golf & Country Club has 27 holes, 18 of which - the Meadow and Cypress nines were open when we were there. "Very playable, very challenging," said Dave Stewart, director of golf. And we agree.

Emerald Greens considers itself a 'boutique' golf resort. With the fullservice elements of a private golf club,(including air-conditioned golf cars) and luxury hotel, it's a unique stay & play resort that offers luxurious two-bedroom, two-bath villa accommodations instead of hotel rooms. Each has a fully equipped top-of-the-line kitchen, HD TVs and memory foam beds. Tennis and aquatic centers, gourmet dining, the Oasis Day Spa and an expansive Southern-style clubhouse terrace make Emerald Greens a wonderful place to relax amid attentive luxury.

Arnold Palmer's Legacy Golf Club www.legacygolfclub.com at Lakewood Ranch, near Bradenton was our first contemporary designed course on the tour. A Troon Golf property, the Legacy Club is everything you'd expect from a Palmer-designed course, making it a true quality golf experience. Big water and big sand bunkers, with greens that hold - yet allow heavy or wayward shots to slip into the water, are part of what I enjoyed about this beautiful tract.

At Venetian Golf and River Club www.venetiangolfandriver. com in North Venice, our most memorable experience was an eagle on the fourth hole - a real eagle, with feathers, talons, and piercing eyes that followed Paul's steps as he approached his tee shot, which somehow ended up right under the bird! Built four and a-half years ago, Venetian Golf and River Club is a Chip Powell design and WCI Communities property. Playing here, you really begin to experience Florida's Myakka river environment and natural wildlife habitats. Lots of water and wetlands, an open layout, white sands and flat terrain tell you, you're in Southern Florida. You also learn that a

ball in the water is a lost ball - no fishing 'em out of these waters, which are likely hosts to alligators and snakes.

Riverwood Golf Club in Port Charlotte www.riverwoodgc.com is also built off of the Myakka River. Designed by Gene Bates in 1992, the course is host to a number of state and local championships. Rated four and a-half stars by Golf Digest for the nearly a decade and voted one of the most womenfriendly courses in 2000, Riverwood offers two distinctive nines. The front nine has winding fairways and pines, while the back

has salt marshes, natural areas and native plant life. There's lots of water, but it's a bit deceptive; you see it, but it really doesn't come into play.

The showcase course of the writer's tour was easily Old Corkscrew in Estero www.oldcorkscrew.com . This Jack Nicklaus-designed signature masterpiece is a stand-alone course. No condos, no houses...just you, the course and nature...and it's spectacular. The Nicklaus architects have crafted a course that capitalizes on the area's natural beauty. With added mounding and plantings, it is a unique, and often breathtaking, Florida property.

Voted 2008 Florida Course of the Year by the National Golf Course Owners Association, Old Corkscrew opened in February 2007. As

described by Head Golf Professional Mike Collins, the course and its surroundings comprise 175 acres near the Everglades - "a pretty sensitive area." And for that reason it will never be further developed. The result is "a beautiful golf experience," he said. "You'll probably be shaking your head a little bit from a scoring perspective, but you'll certainly enjoy it."

Raptor Bay Golf Club in Bonita Springs www.raptorbaygolfclub. com is the first resort golf course globally to receive Certified Gold Signature Sanctuary status from Audubon International. Designed by Raymond Floyd, this is a fun, pretty and very playable resort course. What adds to its speed of play and enjoyment are no sand bunkers. That doesn't mean there aren't other hazards, like water and crushed coquina shell areas with scrub vegetation, which will either eat your ball or skid it off on its merry way.

Currently, Raptor Bay, which is associated with the adjacent the lavish Hyatt Regency Coconut Point www.coconutpoint.hyatt.com has two nines - the Hawk and Osprey - with a third, the Eagle, opening in about two years.

The final stop of our Writer's Cup Gulf tour was The Rookery at Marco Golf Club on Marco Island www.therookeryatmarco.com Part of the impressive Marco Island Marriott Beach Resort http://www.marriott.com/hotels/tra vel/mrkfl , The Rookery was recently rebuilt as part of \$187 million resort renovation, the largest cash investment in any Marriott property in its history. Redesigned by Robert Cupp, Jr., the course is nestled in shallow wetlands that attract many species of birds. Here, our golf car GPS, in addition to yardages, notified us of an occupied eagle's nest, visible in a tall tree behind one of the greens. At more than 7,100 yards from the tips, the Rookery has generous fairways, oversized greens, the option to play from one of five tee locations and of course, wonderful birds and wildlife.

Our weeklong trip was a great tour and a doable one for weeklong travelers who want to golf the Gulf. Paul and I came back to Michigan with lots of great memories and with the winning team trophies - our challenging Michigan courses had taught us well! *MG*

Sweetgrass: Destined to be One of U.P.'s Finest

The golf architectural firm of Albanese and Lutzke has great blood lines.

Albanese, Harvard educated, got his training under Matthews and Associates and then partnered up with Ray Hearn, another Matthews alum. Under Matthews,

he worked on Hunters's Ridge, Wyandotte Shores and Timberstone. Under Hearn, he assisted with Moose Ridge, Quail Ridge and Royal Scott.

Lutzke, worked with Pete Dye, on the Ocean Course at Kiawah Island, Whistling Straits, Barefoot Landing and is now working with Dye on the Dye Course at French Lick Resort and Casino. His first solo work was at Eagle Eye in Bath. In fact, in a real show of professional courtesy, Pete Dye dropped by to give Lutzke support on the Grand Opening. In order for a golf architect to be invited to join the American Association of Golf Course Architects, they must have completed the equivalent of five 18-hole golf courses. In midyear, the Albanese & Lutzke firm, will have two courses between them. If they are to reach their personal and professional goals of five apiece ot 10 collectively, they will probably have to develop more outstate business.

Sweetgrass is the first course with Albanese as architect of record and it is sweet. Sweetgrass Golf Course is located behind the new 11-story Island Resort and Casino complex in Harris.

The course is scheduled to open this summer and should have no problems with the date, as much of it has grown in already.

Sweetgrass is built on some fairly flat farm land, with only a trace of woods to define some holes. There is a creek that runs through the property that gives the course some additional definition.

Sweetgrass is destined to be one of the Upper Peninsula finest. It will join Wild Bluff, Greywalls, The Rock and Timberstone as the U.P.'s top tracts. *MG*

Club Rentals - A Pricey Alternative to Pack n' Haul

nowing I'd be at nine golf courses and five hotels/ condos in six days as part of the Florida Writer's Cup tour last October, the thought of hauling my golf clubs around seemed cumbersome and daunting. So I decided to board the

decided to board the rental-club train, and essentially borrow clubs at each location.

There were two benefits to this. One, the obvious, no pack n' haul. And two, I could test out new clubs, which I'm actually in the market to purchase soon.

At first I was nervous. Nine new courses, nine different sets of clubs? What would that do my average-at-best golf game? I packed my shoes, my choice of balls, my trusty old putter (which was starting to fail me), my tee bag and spare glove....my

12-year-old daughter had 'borrowed' my better glove and not yet returned it. That cost me one 'confidence' demerit. But with that bit of 'my stuff,' I was ready to tackle the club rental adventure. What I learned was surprisingly interesting, game changing and worth sharing!

First of all, daily rentals are not cheap. Priced at \$35 to 40 or more

quality clubs! However, because I was 'comped' on the rentals for this trip, cost was luckily not an issue, and I could focus on the clubs themselves

Only a couple of rentals includ-



at each course, total rentals for our nine-course tour would have easily cost me somewhere around \$400. That's a good entry to the purchase range of a new set of ed one or two sleeves of balls. With water and hazards abound, one sleeve wouldn't have been enough for me. Two? Maybe. But I ended up buying a dozen more balls at one of the pro shops. With the nine or so that I brought from home, I'd be good to go. I could lose balls and take a few risky shots with peace of mind.

The best part about my rental experience is that every course we played offered me a quality set of clubs. I played with Nike, King Cobra, Taylor Made, Ping and Callaway sets, and Titleist,

TaylorMade, Cobra and predominantly Odyssey putters. Most of the clubs were in nearly new condition. Previously shy of trying a new putter, I used the rental putters with grand curiosity - and they served me well. My old 'Baron' stayed in the bag while I mastered the greens - and improved my putting - with the benefit of newer designs and technology, balanced weighting and better grips. I basically found all of the putters acceptable and better than my old standby.

On the full set side, random clubs were a little more risky for me. I found the Callaway X-18 Gems to be too whippy and short for my game. As a result, I splayed the ball with miss-hits. One of my playing partners, Scott, with his

fabulous Canadian accent and 'ehs' told me he'd never seen a golfer hit sideways like I did, eh?! Yikes! For me those clubs were a total mismatch - and I had to play with them twice, by default, on the tour.


On the other hand, when clubs worked for me, they really worked. The TaylorMade set helped me hit more solidly. And while using them, I improved my distance considerably impressing my male teammates, who said they'd want me on their scramble team any day!

My favorite clubs were the King Cobra M Speed driver www.cobragolf.com and 3100 I/H irons and Taylor Made R7 Draws http://www.taylormadegolf.com. I hit the offset Cobra driver a country mile -OK, not a country mile, but consistently in the 180 to 20-yard range, which for me, is really far. And the rest of the Cobras worked well for me, too.

I also found that I wasn't a hybrid club fan. I like 'me mashie!'... just give me irons and woods. Because of this, I was often at a disadvantage as a set often didn't include a three iron, instead opting for some kind of hybrid mix.

At one course, I played with plastic wrapped demos, which was annoying. And at another I was missing a pitching wedge - again one of my stronger short-game assets. My club rental experience was really variable - but overall, very positive. My game changing lessons were that 1.) Equipment matters; and 2.) New is good. And with the plusses and minuses of each set, I think overall, I played better than I usually did with my own clubs.

My Baron putter will probably never forgive me its now permanent retirement, but the White Hot Odyssey XG (www.odysseygolf. com) really is hot. And I now have another big decision to make... Which new club set do I want and when?! MG

fresh dusting of snow graced the lawn and "Sleigh Ride" droned. I sat in the car knowing it was time. I'd resisted until the sixth of December, but at last my golf clubs had to make their journey from trunk to basement.

The moment is always bittersweet, whether it happens, as it often does in Michigan, around Halloween or during the year's final month. For this northern golfer the game is laid

to rest, buried under a layer of brilliant white.

I admit that snow can have its golfing benefits. Two weeks before Christmas the normally scruffy course I pass each day shows newly revealed beauty, its humble terrain a giant sculpture gallery. Snow fences, like velvet ropes surrounding a precious work of art, protect all-tootempting greens from skiers or marauding snowmobilers. Whatever the visual dazzle of a course in winter, though, the scene saddens me. Golf is a game of aesthetic pleasures, its raptures coming less from successful strikes or well-played holes than from a brilliant white ball in flight against blue sky, across fiery autumn hardwoods, down a fairway's vivid greens. Today's overwhelming whiteness only reminds me just how fleeting are such joys, like the rare perfect shot. I must have presented a curious sight to anyone peering out the window to learn whether the snow had begun again and whether to resume the West Michigan rhythm of shovel-wait-shovel-wait. Hauling clubs from the trunk in my electric blue winter coat and heavy black mittens, I thought, These colors are wrong, or I could pantomime the scene on my Christmas tie--Santa gripping a large candy cane to putt out, while Rudolph tends the flag.

The weight of my unwieldy black bag, stuffed with a late season's harvest of balls, soon brought other scenes to mind as I lugged it from driveway to front porch A funeral hearse I had just passed on the road. Then a poignant moment from Deadwood in which Sheriff Bullock carries across his porch a coffin he has just built to hold his stepson.

To call my rite a funeral was overstatement, though it did for-

mally bury the golf season. My clubs would now rest in a dark and cold basement corner. beside shelves of wooden clementine boxes filled with shag balls instead of golden citrus. Dozens and dozens of them, always to be hoarded, seldom to be hit. Someday, I tell myself, someday. But season after season, no matter how many I add to a small bucket at the driving range, the stacks grow taller, bursting with used Top Flites, Maxflis, and Pinnacles uncovered in the weeds or woods,

scooped from muddy shallows.

Each lost ball, I suppose, ties me to hundreds of unknown golfers whose hopes--for a moment--were shattered with the sickening thwack of surlyn against pine, or the grim certainty of a hook that starts left and continues its curve, on and on, seemingly forever. A mausoleum of golf dreams.

Yet like the faithful who believe in the body's resurrection, in eternity's promises, doesn't the golfer believe with all his soul in spring's return, the reawakening of a green so alive that the shining ball in descent yields its cold whiteness to a vast verdant life?

Too deep a question, perhaps, for one who mostly wanted to squeeze out one last sunny day above 45 degrees, one more round whose blank and pristine scorecard whispers so much hope, so much possibility. All to be betrayed in the end, of course, as the smudged scorecards in my bag's pockets remind me.

I bid farewell to those bogey-free fantasies for the long, dark months to come and pull my putter from the bag. My nemesis, the destroyer of low-scoring dreams. With the practice greens resting under a hard white frosting, the dining room rug will have to suffice. If I spend enough time hitting ten-footers across its blues, creams, and violets, somehow ingraining precision and calm, routine and inspiration, who knows what might happen by July?

From a large stack of Christmas cds I hunt one that suits my mood--Jingle Bell Jazz seems right, with Billie Holiday singing "I've Got My Love to Keep Me Warm." I place a winter white Titleist on the carpet and assume my stance. Follow the line, I tell myself, then focus on the stroke. Don't be distracted by the robin's song or the fresh scent of the new grass. *MG*

'Infante Terrible' was the early name they hung on Tom Doak before he started getting covers on state and national golf pulbications. Dave Richards was Doak's original public relations representative and made sure that we all knew Doak was someday going to be someone special. He also could become an apologist if Doak went too far with one of his candid comments about other designers' work.

Ron Whitten in his review, said "Someday, maybe sooner rather than later, Sebonack might join neighbors Shinnecock and the National Golf Links in that pan-

An Evening With Tom Doak http://youtube.com/watch?v=N1Ef64EjCSs Doak has always been very sure of himself, but really, why not? He had gone to Cornell University and went through the same program as Robert Trent Jones. He got a scholarship from the university and studied in the British Isles and Australian for a year. Not only did he study, but he took photographs of what he liked and disliked to compliment his own photographic memory. After that, and we might be rushing his life story a little bit, he spend some time with Pete Dye.

His first course was High Pointe GC in Williamsburg, was followed by Black Forest in Gaylord and then eventually, his final course in Michigan, Lost Dunes Golf Club in Bridgman. Below is listed the body of the work for his Renaissance Golf Design company, which is located in Traverse City. His reputation began to take off with his work at Pacific Dunes and then got he received international acclaim with his masterpiece in New Zealand, the Cape Kidnappers GC.

During an "Evening With Tom Doak" that took place at High Pointe GC in the summer of 2004, Doak talked about the upcoming collaboration with Nicklaus that was to produce the Sebonack Golf Club. This seemed quite a stretch for Doak, as he had been critical of Nicklaus' early work. However, he indicated a bit of a change on his thinking with the later works of Nicklaus and that he felt that they could work together. Such was the enormity of the project in both the cost and location of the. neither architect wanted to turn down the opportunity. The land itself cost \$44 million. As it turned out,

the collaboration was hugely successful.




